Winter Ploughing Match at Lathbury

The North Bucks Vintage Tractor Club held their annual winter ploughing match and first of the 2017 year at Lathbury in Milton Keynes on Sunday the 22nd of January. Every year we hold a ploughing match in memory of Peter Cook a well-known and loved farmer in the Sherington/Lathbury area who died of cancer. Peter's Dad, Michael Cook donated a Silver Plate in Peter's name and this is awarded to the club member who achieves the highest score on the day.



It was an awesome sight of the sun rising on the horizon when we arrived and as always looking for a chance of a good photo, it was a great opportunity to catch a few shots of your favourite tractors with the sun as the background. Despite the very frosty weather (-7°C) first thing we had a good turn out, fifty-seven ploughmen booked in and only five did not made it on the day. Classes were, classic, vintage mounted, trailed, horticultural and novice. It is good to see that both trailed and horticultural keep increasing in numbers and ploughmen travel from as far afield as Wiltshire, Hertfordshire and Oxfordshire to compete.



Always by far the most popular class is vintage mounted we had fifteen competitors and the most popular tractor is the grey Fergie (in all its fifty shades of grey). Sadly not a winning tractor make this time, it was an International and a MF that took the two top spots. On the



First time competing in the classic class, after graduating from the novice class at our Hanslope match, was Ellie Bullard on her Nuffield. Ellie was trying out a new plough for the first time so there was a lot of adjustments going on first thing but she soon mastered it. Ellie came third in her class with only one point between her and the second place.



There were very disappointing results for the trailed class who normally score the highest points in any of our matches. However Max Cherry took the top spot and well deserved. With only nine points behind was James Britton with his fabulous Cat D2. It is only the second time that the Cat has been out ploughing, and is now running really well, with Paul Gent helping with the setup of the plough will it be in for a first on future matches?

It was a good turnout in the horticultural class and although because of the frosty conditions most of them delayed their start. Once the ground defrosted the ground conditions



Hartwell Farm words Caroline Howe

It was great to host the tractor run in December and welcoming you all to our farm in Cranfield.

There have been Howe's at the farm since 1914 when Algernon, father to Dick, took over the rental of the farm. It was a Quaker property and as a result, all monies from the rent paid were used to provide accommodation in Alms Houses in the village for old folk. There was also provision for firewood, and Christmas treats too. The 'Hartwell' Alms Houses are on the High Street in the village, and. until very recently, still provided accommodation for older residents.

The actual farmhouse dates back to Elizabethan times; it consisted of two floors and was seen

as quite an upmarket establishment because of this! There are a wealth of beams in this section of the house with many of them coming from abandoned ships. The large façade was built in the early Georgian period and has most of its windows filled in due to the window tax implemented by the government during the 1800's.

The Quaker influence is very interesting. We have looked at archive material showing that in the late 1600's Richard Hartwell left the farm to go to the New World. He was one of the early pioneers and worked on the design and construction of roads in Massachusetts. He also built his own house in New England and also called it Hartwell Farm.

The farm was badly damaged in the war when a bomb dropped close by to the house. Almost all of the agricultural buildings were destroyed including a small house in the farmyard. The main house survived apart from a few collapsed ceilings and broken windows. Dick remembers the night very well as a youngster terrified in his bed. When Dick left college he returned to work on the farm. From the 50's onwards he grew a range of crops on the 50 acres of agricultural land including potatoes and Brussel sprouts. The main business, however was pigs and poultry. It was very hard work with very little mechanisation involved.

During the 80's it was clear that this size of farm could not be financially sustainable. At

the same time John left school, and completed an apprenticeship in agricultural engineering. Slowly but surely there were less pigs around, we no longer sold farm fresh turkeys at Christmas nor eggs at the back door. Instead JR Trolleys began. The pig units disappeared and in their place we built the workshops and filled them with all the equipment a small engineering business would need. John and Dick began making equipment for the baking industry and this has continued ever since. They supply all sorts of companies from Mc Donald's to the local baker. They make anything from fencing and sofa frames to baking trays and racks and trolleys.

John and Lucy got married in 1990 and built their own house on the site of the pig farrowing pens. At this point Lucy joined the thriving business. Later Charlie and then Tom were born. Both boys have been involved with all aspects of the business as well as completing their own formal education.

Throughout the 90's Dick began a huge project of planting trees and digging out ponds on the land. Now they are established the land has reverted to a tranquil and quiet place with beautiful trees and walkways. In recent years we have acquired 3 pigs – nothing like the numbers we used to have that are happily grazing in the woodland and busy providing ourselves and our friends with plenty of delicious home reared pork from their off spring.







The young farmers helped to prepare the site the day before. And we had 49 ploughmen entered in five classes, Novice, Vintage Mounted, Classic, Trailed and Horticultural.



There was a lot of expert advice available to the horticultural entrants from the array of very expert ploughmen who came to watch which is really good to see.

Much help and advice was given to James Britton who was out for the first time with his Cat D2 and three furrow Ransomes plough. The Cat had required a great deal of fettling from James and Richard Wray in the weeks before to get it working properly. Not helped by UK customs holding up the vital parts coming from the USA for some pathetic pedantic reason of procedure. This necessitated borrowing a Mag, then making

The Novice class was all young farmers and saw Ellie Bullard scoring the second highest score of the day to beat her brother Josh. It seems that all are own club members have either got better and won competitions or have given up.

The horticultural class was as usual high scoring and is always a pleasure to watch. These guys put in a lot of effort into making there ploughing equipment as good as

Saleing with PG Cheffins Autumn Vintage Collective Sale

Cheffins autumn vintage tractor collective sale is, to my mind, the best of the three sales. The quantity and diversity of lots is really tremendous; from motorcycles, commercial vehicles, tractors, implements, stationary engines, steam engines, right through to printed sales literature and technical manuals.

Normally, at Cheffins sales, there are at least four auctioneers going at any one time. So it is a bit of a game to keep track of everything, if you have a particular interest in something but something else is being sold by another auctioneer, you inevitably find that you need to be in two places at once. However, with practice (and they're all selling in the same yard) it has been easy enough to cope with.

Unfortunately this has all changed as the bigticket items are sold in a marquee: separate to





the sale-ground. From the auctioneers point of view this, I'm sure, seems like a good idea: it is faster and probably safer as it is less likely that one gets run over by the auctioneers vehicle (which goes from lot to lot). However, inevitably one loses track of what the other auctioneers are doing.

Thorneycroft Trencher: an amazing World War 2 beast. Reputed to travel at approximately half-a-mile per day when trenching. In surprisingly good order and appeared complete. Made £1600 which I would have thought was pretty reasonable; although I suspect has a horrific fuel bill to run (as it's petrol!) - I think you'd be the only man on the show ground with one of these.

A very interesting Fordson Major Grader which was made by Aveling Barford with midmounted grader-blade and front dozer-blade, which made a very interesting spectacle; for Fordson Major fans, this was an interesting variation on the theme. I don't know if anybody has ever worked out how many applications these wonderful tractors were put to, but this certainly looked a business-like machine.

An interesting horticultural tractor/roller featured next. Fitted with a Ford Model A side-valve petrol engine it was rigged up as a roller but also had a set of pneumatic tires and a tool-bar. Very nicely presented and made approximately £1800.

A fascinating gun-tractor from The First World War. The Holt 50 was an amazing machine:





part-caterpillar tractor, part-roller in it's configuration; this particular one saw action in the war for towing a Howitzer heavy artillery gun. Interestingly, last year, an identical Holt 50 sold at the Paul Wrackham auction for £150,000, so everybody in the sale room was amazed when Roger Desborough managed to purchase this one for £62,000: in the sales literature for this item, it was pictured towing a huge gun around the show-ground at Dorset Steam Fair. Upon confirming that he had the winning bid, he said to the auctioneer, "I want the gun as well you know!" much to the amusement of those present. It transpired that the Holt sold last year has been on the film-set of a WW1 battle and has been hired for the filming for £20,000/week. Nobody seemed sure how many weeks it had been there, but does perhaps explain the very strong price that was paid for it.

What is this? Answers in the next newsletter: (As I did discover what it was actually used for) Each side is approximately 3ft long and standing off the ground on legs roughly 2ft. obviously this had had considerable use for something-or-other and was very interesting.

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


