# Tony Cooper ARPS. AWPF - Don McCullin Retrospective

Tony talked to us this evening about Don McCullin the Somerset based world famous photographer known particularly for his war photography. Tony knows Don personally so he was able to relate many unknown facts about him. Tony who is known for his dry wit and laid back approach always researches his subject thoroughly and this evening was no exception, at the end of his talk you were left with a feeling that we had just had a condensed biography of Don McCullen. We saw Dons early images, from when he was learning his trade, the images taken at many of the war zones he covered, finishing with some local landscapes.

Malcolm Sales QUEP, ARPS, ABIPP - An Introduction to Smartphone Photography Malcolm joined us on zoom this evening from his home in Rushcliffe. Using a range of free Apps. Malcolm demonstrated how to manipulate your Smartphone images into quality photographs. I believe that most of us were surprised with how a Smartphone image can be improved using free software. Malcolm did use some AI. which would not be acceptable in photographic competitions, but it is acceptable for your own personal use. A very interesting and enlightening evening.

## Don Bishop ARPS - Visions of the Landscape

This evening Don showed us some of his outstanding landscape photographs. Don who lives in West Huntspill travels all over Great Britain, taking his landscapes, seascapes, mountains, rivers and snow scenes, he is very meticulous ensuring the lighting is just right, going back to the same location several times until he achieves the image he wants. not forgetting Dons passion Railway photography. He also showed us many images of steam trains taken at locations selected by Don when on his railway trips. This is how Don got into photography some 35 years ago via his railway hobby and wanting to record trains. This was an exceptional evening with some first class images shown by Don, which was appreciated, and enjoyed by all who attended.

#### My Accessories - Peter Weaver

You might have the latest camera with all the up-to-date features but the quality of the image is determined by the quality of the lens you use. You do not have to buy the same manufacturers lens for your camera. If you have the correct adapter you can chose, say a Sigma lens on your camera. Look closely at the independent lenses, as some are better than others. Also some systems change lens mounts and type of lenses with an upgrade- eg. Canon DSLR lenses are different to those used on their mirror less cameras, so you need to buy an adapter. Do not forget that with cropped sensors the focal length increases so the figures in the following applies to full frame sensors.

#### **Standard Lens**

A fixed focus lens, say 50mm. I started out with one of these lenses and only being able to use one of these made me think a lot more about my photography. You have got to move to the correct viewpoint. These lenses are often faster, eg. up to f1.8 or f1.4.

## **Zoom and Fixed Focal Length Lenses**

Many people disagree with what they want in their camera bag. Some people only use fixed focal length lenses such as 24mm, 35mm, 100mm, 200mm, ect.

These lenses whilst some consider offer better image quality do restrict you if you need to get a different viewpoint relatively quickly. If you do not know what you are going to photograph your camera bag will be full with lots of lenses and sometimes to get the photograph you want you will have to keep changing lenses. Zoom lenses offer you the flexibility although the widest aperture on these lenses are f4, or f5.6, are not as wide as some fixed focus lenses, unless you decide you want to spend some extra money.

#### **Standard Zoom**

This typically covers 28mm to 70mm, so 28mm is towards the wide angle and 70mm. towards the telephoto. This is the standard lens for me and is suitable for most photographic subjects.

## Wide Angle Zoom and Wide Angle Standard Lenses

Mine is 16-35mm, particularly useful for landscapes where you might want to include more of the scene. It also allows me to make more use of foreground interest.

## Mid-Range telephotos or Mid Range Standard Lenses

Covers 70mm to 200mm. Very useful if you need to get closer to your subject but are unable to walk there.

With the longer lenses you run the risk of getting an image suffering from shake but these days more lenses offer image stabilisation and also some cameras do as well. This can give you an extra four or five stops or more. With portraits these lenses enable you to take images of your subject without 'crowding' and your landscapes you can compress the view.

#### **Long Telephoto Lenses**

For example 300mm to 500mm. These lenses are much more expensive and you should only buy these if you think you will need to use these lenses often enough. They are heavy to carry around.

#### **Macro Lenses**

These offer great detail and a shallow depth of field but requie a lot of care to use successfully.

#### **Close-Up Lenses**

These look like filters and screw onto the front of the lens.

#### Shift and Tilt Lenses

Used often in architectural photography to correct converging verticals. The camera back is kept parallel to the building and the lens if tilted in the same way as rising front movement of some technical cameras.

#### **Mirror Lenses**

Used for long focal length's and usually with a fixed aperture, which some people find is to slow and they can be fairly fragile.

#### **Fish-Eye Lenses**

These can cover 360 degrees and give a drastic, distorting effect. Very much a special effect lens.

## **Adapters**

Very useful, you can extend the length of your lens such as 1:4 or 2.

#### **Compact Cameras**

More and more photographers are ditching there heavy bag of DSLR's and selection of lenses and opting for a compact camera. These are lighter smaller and can produce equally if not better results than DSLR's. Technology has moved forward in recent years and the compact camera of today is very high spec, full frame sensor, far more pixels than you need, live view finder, and compact telephoto lens.. This was led by Fuji initially, followed very quickly after by Nikon, and Cannon ect. The latest offering from Fuji is the Fujicolour Ripla-1ST, mirrorless digital camera. This has an X-Tran CMOS 26 million pixel full frame sensor, a stabilised body with a live view finder, and a LCD touch screen with all the adjustment you could possibly need. File formats Raw, JPEG, TIFF, ect. High speed processor, built in flash. What is unique about the body, it is the first camera to use an alexa type voice control to change the settings, ie. ISO, aperture, speed, single, or multiple shot, one or two stop compensation, in fact all of the camera settings. The body coupled with a interchangeable 28mm to 270mm f2.8 compact zoom lens weighs only 990 grams, which is currently on sale for £1750, you may find it cheaper elsewhere. One body, plus one lens, you cannot travel much lighter than that. For those of you who are in the market for a new camera it is worth looking at a compact camera, I believe this is the way forward.
