INTRODUCTION TO COMPETITIONS

Note: This is intended as an introduction to competitions in the club.
Full details of our Competition Rules can be found in the Club Rules.

We have two types of club competitions for members:

1. **Three Round Competitions.** There are three competitions: Colour prints, Monochrome prints and Projected Digital Images (PDIs), with three rounds for each competition. Images can be of any subject e.g. landscape, portrait, natural history, street etc.
 - Each competition is split into two Classes – ‘A’ & ‘B’, with the more experienced members in the ‘A’ Class.
 - In each round of each competition you can enter up to 4 prints/digital images.
 - Entries are marked out of 10.
 - At the end of the season we take your top 5 scores to find a winner of each Class in each competition. The winner of the ‘B’ Class is promoted to the ‘A’ Class.

Note 1: It is helpful for us to see some of your photographs to make sure you are entered in the correct class initially.

Note 2: A monochrome print is a black and white print or a black and white print which has been uniformly toned with one tone. The addition of partial toning or the addition of one colour to any part of the image makes it a colour image.

2. **Open Competitions.** These are held annually with members from both ‘A’ and ‘B’ Classes competing together. There are usually separate competitions for Prints & PDIs. In general you enter a maximum of 5 entries (prints, PDIs or a mix of both). The judge picks a winner and awards a number of certificates.

We vary the number and categories of Open competitions each year and may include:

- Portrait – which can be formal or candid.
- Natural History – any aspect of the natural world e.g. flora, fauna or geological. Domesticated animals & cultivated plants are not allowed.
- Street - digital images only (no print competition). Entries should consist of subjects in candid situations in public places.
- Set Subject – a different subject is chosen each year.
- Outings – for photos taken on club outings.
- Themed Prints – prints only; minimum of 3 images on a theme of your choosing on one mount.
- 5 to 8 Sequences – PDIs only; 5 to 8 images on a theme or subject of your choosing; maximum of 3 sequences.
- Print & PDI of the Year – for work that has been in internal competition in the last year (to find the best of the best).
- Annual Exhibition of prints and PDIs

In all competitions, you must indicate an order of preference for your entries. If we are over-subscribed for the competition, the number of entries per person may be reduced accordingly.

Inter Club Competitions

In addition, as a member of both the South London Federation (SLF) and of the Surrey Photographic Association (SPA) we compete against other clubs in London and Surrey.

Entering Competitions

Competitions provide a great way of getting feedback on your work and improving your photography. Members are always willing to help and offer advice – please ask if you need assistance.

The easiest and cheapest way to start competing is to enter the PDI Competitions. Your images will be loaded into our competition software, DiCentra, for digital projection on competition night.

Projected Digital Images (PDI) Competitions

1. **Entries MUST be received in the specified format by the PDI Competition Secretary** (Mike Griffiths, ms_griffiths@btinternet.com) **at least 1 week before the competition** or they are likely to be refused entry. This allows sufficient time to load all entries into the competition software and prepare scoring sheets.
2. **Images must be JPG format only with MAXIMUM dimensions of 1400 pixels (horizontal width) x 1050 pixels (vertical height)**. Note that an image presented in PORTRAIT format must not exceed 1050 pixels in height. Please refer to the '*How to Resize an image for Competitions*' for more detailed instructions.
3. Images must be set up in the **sRGB colour space** / profile.
4. Each PDI file must be given a unique filename. The naming convention is to show the number indicating order of preference followed by a space and then your image title which will be the EXACT title which you wish it to have when displayed in competition. For example, if you had 3 images called 'Beach Hut Garden', 'Lichens' and 'Between the Rocks' and wanted them entered in that order, you would name your files:
 - 1 Beach Hut Garden
 - 2 Lichens
 - 3 Between the RocksYou should be aware that if the competition is oversubscribed the number of entries per person will be reduced in line with your preferences.
5. Spaces are permitted in the title of your image so that the title projects as you intend.
6. Entries must be stored in a folder which is called your name e.g. Joe Bloggs. Photographic distinctions may also be added e.g. Joe Bloggs LRPS.
7. Entries can be submitted by email or on a memory stick given to the PDI Competition Secretary (Mike Griffiths, ms_griffiths@btinternet.com). Please refer to the '*OCCC PDI Competition – Email Submission Instructions*' for more detailed instructions.

Entering Competitions

Printed Image Competitions

1. **Prints must be mounted on board and labelled on the back** using the format provided.
2. **Give your entries to the Print Competition Secretary, Peter Farrelly (occcprint@virginmedia.com) 1 week before the competition.**
3. Also, **email small size JPGs of your entries** (max 1400 pixels wide x 1050 pixels high) **to the Print Competition Secretary at least 1 week before the competition.** This is so we have a record of the print and can prepare scoring sheets.
4. Prints may be any size; A4-A3 is most usual, but smaller is very acceptable.
5. The prints can be produced by you or can be printed commercially (a number of members use DS Colour Labs <http://www.dscolourlabs.co.uk/>).
6. Print competition entries must be mounted on board. Neutral colour mount boards are most suitable for the majority of prints.
7. Most members choose mount board that is 40cm x 50cm. This is a standard size required for most external photographic competitions, but you may prefer a smaller size to reduce cost. The mount board must not be smaller than 20cm x 25cm. We don't specify a maximum size however there may be problems displaying mount boards larger than 65cm high x 60cm wide with the current equipment.
8. The print may be stuck to the board (spray mount is easiest) or a window cut in the mount with backing board.
9. A label must be attached clearly on the back of the mount board. Label templates are provided by the club (please contact the Club Secretary for a copy of the template). The label should show your name, title of print, competition being entered for, the order of preference you want them shown 1-4 etc, whether A or B class (if appropriate) and the competition date. You should be aware that if the competition is oversubscribed the number of entries per person will be reduced in line with your preferences.
10. Please make sure that there is nothing on your entry (print and board) that might damage other work. Good quality mounting tape should be used when attaching backing board – masking tape should **not** be used as it peels off and can damage other work.

Frequently Asked Questions

Question 1: How do you ensure that any prints or PDIs I enter in to a competition are judged fairly?

Answer: Competitions are usually judged by an external judge. The Three Round Competitions (Colour Print, Mono Print and PDI (Projected Digital Image)) are held in two Classes, A and B, to allow members to feel comfortable that their images are being judged alongside images of a similar standard. This also allows judges to give appropriate comments and advice to each Class, normally giving more time to the less experienced photographers in the B Class.

Question 2: If members are divided into Classes based upon their photographic experience, how do members move up a Class?

Answer: Most new members start in the B Class. Those with photographic distinctions or qualifications will be automatically in the A class. Experienced new members may provide a selection of images for review by the Selection Committee to determine the most suitable Class. The winner of each Three Round Competition in the B class will move up to the A Class. There is no demotion currently.

Question 3: I submitted an image into a Three Round Competition, but it did not score as high as I had anticipated. Is it possible to get another judge's opinion?

Answer: If it scored 7½ or less in a Three Round Competition it can be entered in to a subsequent Three Round Competition or bring it along to a discussion evening. An image used in a Three Round Competition can be used again in Open competitions such as Street, Natural History etc. Any image may be entered in to the Annual Exhibition so long as it has not been in any previous year's Exhibition.

Question 4: My image did reasonably well in a Three Round Competition; however, the judge made some useful suggestions on how it could be improved. Is it acceptable to reprocess the image, cropping differently, adjusting colour and brightness etc. and submit it into a subsequent Three Round Competition?

Answer: Only if scored 7½ or less.

Question 5: Can prints and PDIs entered in to Open competitions be used in a Three Round Competition?

Answer: Yes.

Question 6: Can I use the same image in more than one competition – print/PDI?

Answer: It depends - an image used in a Three Round Competition can be used again in Open competitions such as Street, Natural History etc. Any image may be entered in to the Annual Exhibition so long as it has not been in any previous year's Exhibition. You are not allowed to show an image in more than one of Colour Print, Mono print or PDI Three Round Competitions as continual repetition of the same image can be very tedious for the audience and unfair to other members.
