Luke 21: 5-19. The Destruction of the Temple and Signs of the End Times. [The Message]

One day people were standing around talking about the Temple, remarking how beautiful it was, the splendour of its stonework and memorial gifts. Jesus said, "All this you are admiring so much – the time is coming when every stone in that building will end up in a heap of rubble."

They asked him: "Teacher, when is this going to happen? What clue will we get that it is about to take place?"

He said: "Watch out for the doomsday deceivers. Many leaders are going to show up with forged identities, claiming 'I'm the One' or 'The end is near'. Don't fall for any of that. When you hear of wars and uprisings, keep your head, and don't panic. This is routine history and no sign of the end."

He went on, "Nation will fight nation and ruler fight ruler, over and over. Huge earthquakes will occur in various places. There will be famines. You will think at times that the very sky is falling.

But before any of this happens, they will arrest you, and hunt you down, and drag you to court and jail. It will go from bad to worse, dog-eat-dog – everyone at your throat because you carry my name. You will end up on the witness stand, called to testify. Make up your mind right now not to worry about it. I will give you the words and wisdom that reduce all your accusers to stammers and stutters.

You'll even be turned in by parents, brothers, relatives, and friends. Some of you will be killed. There is no telling who will hate you because of me. Even so, every detail of your body and soul – even the hairs of your head – is in my care; nothing of you will be lost. Staying with it – that is what is required. Stay with it till the end. You will not be sorry for you will be saved."

Comment:

Jesus was never one to promise that there would always be good times. He was well aware of the troubles which beset our fallen world – both personal and national.

There were some people admiring the Temple and its sheer beauty – and it was hardly surprising. There had been rebuilding going on for 50 years and it was becoming more and more splendid. The cloisters and the columns were made of pure white marble. There was a vine made of gold and each cluster of grapes was as tall as a man! The historian, Josephus, in his book *The War of the Jews*, wrote that the front of the Temple was 'covered all over with plates of gold'.......and at the first rising of the sun, reflected a fiery splendour – and those who looked straight at it would have to look away, just as if they were looking straight at the sun. For strangers coming upon the area, while they were still a way away, would see the Temple as if it was a mountain covered with snow, for the parts of it that were not gilt, they were exceeding white.'

It is hardly surprising, then, that it was so admired – but, as always with beautiful objects and places, there was a danger that people began to worship the beauty of the symbols of worship, and not the true subject. Jesus could sense the troubles ahead. In their attempt to make him a king, the people would already be showing signs of political unrest and Jesus could see a disaster in the making should there be a head-on clash with the Romans.

Indeed, the Temple was not finished till AD 64 and in just two years strife had already broken out and by AD70 Jerusalem had fallen, the Temple was destroyed as was the city. Over a million Jews died in this conflict and a further 97,000 were taken away as captives.

Jesus knew that there would always be wars and rumours of wars – always be earthquakes and other natural disasters. Indeed, they are still rife – and don't the media glory in it all! Just because we are Christians doesn't mean that we shall escape all this – the man-made or the natural disasters, the

persecution, or the imprisonments, but Jesus tells us not to be terrified, but to use the time to witness – to know for ourselves that he is always with us throughout all the troubles. And though we may not survive, we shall not truly perish – for us death is not the last thing. Now that truly is Good News! We are not alone for our God is always with us— even in the very dark days — and he gives us the power to endure through the gift of eternal life.

At Remembrance we recall all those who have died or been maimed in war – the great World Wars and the many between them, and since – culminating just now with that in Ukraine. We hear the stories from earlier wars – and we recall the bravery, the courage, the selflessness of so many. Nowadays, we see the horrors of war brought to us daily by the media – we see the dreadful wate of lives – we see the towns laid waste and realise the toll on the people both now and to come. We see the heroism – we see how ordinary people step up and give of themselves to save their neighbour.

Sometimes it can all seem truly despairing – will the warmongers of the world ever learn that starting war is never right. Will they ever learn that just because they want something, they cannot just grab it from others. As Jesus warned, it has gone on through history. So we continue to honour those who fought for freedom and against tyranny – and we must work for peace.
