3rd September: Welcome Night

With the summer break now behind us and holidays just a memory, we reconvene for a new season of talks, workshops, competitions and outings. Whilst welcoming back our members, we also welcome new arrivals to this, our review of the upcoming season. We will preview the programme and also share the experiences of several members during their summer activities.

10th September: The USA Road Trip

George McCarthy FRPS has been taking wildlife images as a professional photographer for over twenty-five years, travelling far and wide in pursuit of his profession. He sat on the nature judging panel for RPS Associateship and Fellowship applications for many years until standing down this year. In 2005, after much soul searching he and his wife Angie flew to Florida, bought a Winnebego motorhome plus a Honda 4WD and set off. During the year their journey took them from the Atlantic coast of Florida to the Pacific coast of California and included forays into Mexico and Canada. They passed through 29 states, drove the infamous 1500 mile Alaskan Highway (both ways) and experienced close encounters with both a Grizzly and a Black Bear. They visited 42 National and State parks, drove over 30,000 miles and for much of that time George was taking photographs virtually on a daily basis. Before leaving, George was fortunate to be commissioned by Practical Photographer Magazine to write a diary of the journey, and the monthly fee went some way to mitigate the massive fuel bills. But, when taking 100's of pictures each month the two pages allocated by PP were inadequate to do justice to their adventure. George rectifies that in this exciting digital lecture.

24th September: The Way I See It

Gerry Coles ARPS, EFIAP, DPAGB, BPE4 has been interested in photography for more years than he cares to remember and like most most club photographers of his generation his main interest was producing black and white prints in the darkroom. He achieved his LRPS in 1988 and ARPS in 1994, both with panels of black and white prints.

He has now completed the transition to digital and enjoys the creative possibilities that are available to us as photographers in this new era. The talk covers his change from film to digital and the work he has been producing since 2009, when he started to enter National and International exhibitions, and since when he has achieved the distinctions seen above. Gerry's talk will be with projected images and he will explain in some cases, the techniques used to produce the final image. 15th October: Working with Cameras in the Polar Regions

Peter Bucktrout, Photographer/Cameraman British Antarctic Survey. Pete, who lives locally, works with the British Antarctic Survey BAS. He moved to BAS from a career as an Industrial Photographer at the Atomic Energy Authority and within the Ministry of Defence. His aim at the time was to see Antarctica, stay a couple of years then get a proper job. Like many at BAS who set out with the same aim, he now realises that this statement was made over twenty years ago!

Pete says modestly that his talk is likely to be a series of "ramblings" about his journeys which he hopes will give an insight into where, how and what he gets up to in the Polar Regions.

22nd October: A Photographer's Travels through China with a non-Photography Family

Club Member and former Photographer of the Year **Julian Johnson** presents a travelogue of experiences of China through the eyes of a foreigner and his family, exploring both the ancient and modern, from dynastic history through to the present day culture and life of one of the most populated countries on Earth. The journey starts in Beijing the thriving capital and concludes in the semi tropical areas further south, and inland from Shanghai. Barrie Hatten DPAGB and Liz Hatten. Barrie and Liz Hatten return with the latest in their series of travelogues, this time covering the savannahs of Southern Tanzania and the rain forests of Cost Rica. The clue is in the title as they treat us to their shots ranging from ants to elephants.

Club member Kevin Lunham ARPS has a strong background in the theory and practice of photography, the latter being exemplified by the outstanding work he contributes to our competitions. In this talk Kevin will take us through life 'PD' or Pre Digital. He will review the origins of photography, how it all got started and how it developed to where we are now. After a bit of theory in the first half of the talk, Kevin will be 'attempting' (he states modestly) to make some portraits using one of the very early processes, so we can see for ourselves the hurdles photographers and subjects had to overcome in those pioneering days.

Stuart Crump ARPS, DPAGB, EFIAP has always had an interest in photography but in 2009, after taking early retirement, he decided to take his hobby more seriously and joined Beeston Camera Club. By reading a lot and going on courses, he improved rapidly. In 2011 he was awarded an LRPS and in 2012 an ARPS and CPAGB. In 2013 he obtained his DPAGB and AFIAP as well as being awarded the Best Projected Colour Award in the N&EMPF Annual Exhibition.

His main subjects are landscapes and he has won a number of international awards for his images. The use of long exposures i.e. between '4' second and 4 minutes has been of special interest for some time. 12th March: (Saturday) Melbourne Trophy Final

17th March: The Greatest Survival Story Ever Told

You couldn't make it up. An expedition enters the Antarctic pack ice, where it becomes trapped. Months later the ship is crushed and sinks and the crew march north, finally taking to two boats in a (successful) bid to reach the inhospitable Elephant Island. Five members then embark on a 900 mile sea joiurney to reach South Georgia, the nearest habitation. From there, after months of tribulation, a rescue mission takes off the Elephant Island crew – and not one life is lost!

Tonight's talk, recounted by Geoff Selley FRGS describes Ernest Shackleton's 1914 – 1917 Antarctic expedition in his ship, the Endurance. What has this to do with a camera club? Simply that Geoff uses the pictures taken on the expedition by the tough New Zealand photographer Frank Hurley which were subsequently used by the Expedition Meteorologist Leonard Hussey as he toured the country in the 1920's describing the events to spellbound audiences.

Judge: Jim Hartje ARPS, EFIAP, APAGB, DPAGB, BPE5*. Entrants may submit up to two sets of five mounted prints on a common theme of the entrant's choice. Each entry will be judged as a whole with print arrangement being taken into consideration. No more than two prints in each entry may have been entered in any previous internal competition, and none may be more than two years old.

3rd April: (Sunday) Outing to Kings Lynn

5th April: Felicity Bickley Trophy for Audio Visual Presentations.

We travel to Bedford Camera Club to defend the trophy, which we retained last season.

7th April: A Studio Session

With the college closed, we are arranging a club session at a local studio, working with models and professional lighting equipment. The location will be advised closer to the event.

14th April: The Creative Side of Me

Malcolm Bumstead BPE2, DPAGB, joined East Ipswich Camera Club about 18 years ago, at a time when his major interest was producing black and white drawings and he didn't own a camera. It happened to be on a competition night following which he went away and bought a Pentax P30T camera in order to branch out and produce Colour images. Ironically, Malcolm fell in love with producing Monochrome prints in the darkroom instead. Currently Malcolm is a member of the Beyond Group.

His main interest now lies in producing 'Creative Still Life' images. He often sketches his ideas first, and then looks for the props to bring his ideas to fruition. He says that the hardest part is giving respect to the background and base. He prefers to use one dominant colour only if possible and to keep his images simple. His major influences in photography are the likes of Salvador Dali and Bob Carlos Clarke, an amalgamation of creativity, drama and simplicity.

Paul Gallagher ARPS has been a fine art black and white and colour photographer for over twenty-seven years, dedicating his photography mostly to Northern England and the Scottish Highlands, predominantly using large format equipment.

He began his photographic career studying graphic design and photography at Southport College of Art, from which he gained a distinction in photography. He also holds an Associateship from the Royal Photographic Society.

Paul is a writer for the Professional Image Maker Magazine and other photographic publications and holds regular exhibitions of his work. He has received several commissions from organisations such as the Environment Agency and the BBC and his work has been used extensively by Epson, Ilford and Permajet to name a few.

His book "Aspects of Expression" discussing the expressive monochrome image was commissioned by Argentum and released in October 2008. Paul's fine art limited edition book "Chords of Grey" was released in 2010 supported by a two-week exhibition in the gallery@oxo in London. "Chords of Grey" has achieved 5 awards to date.

Tonight's talk covers Paul's transition from using solely large format cameras and black and white film to digital equipment, and the exploration of both digital black and white and colour landscape photography in both the UK and Arctic Regions. www.Paulgallagher.co.uk.

Keith contributes photographs and articles to magazines and publications around the world.

He has had a number of books published by Haynes Publishing including Red Arrows in Camera, The Battle of Britain Memorial Flight in camera and The Battle of Britain Memorial Flight Operations Manual. He is currently writing two further books for Haynes on the Avro Shackleton and the Vickers VC-10.

Keith also writes for Pen & Sword Books with both RAF in Camera: 1950s and RAF in Camera: 1960s already on the book shelves.

Keith is a lecturer in Digital Photography at Abbey College and lists flying among his hobbies.

12th May: The Dynamic Image

Nadir Khan's work takes him to some of the most extreme and hostile locations in the world, ranging from from the high mountain peaks to subzero north faces. Simply surviving in these conditions is a challenge but doing so while making images and films adds another level of difficulty. In this talk Nadir relates some of his experiences photographing and filming adventure sports around the world, describes some of the techniques and ideas behind his image making and also discusses some of his equipment choices and post processing techniques.

2nd June: Lucky Imaging of the Planets

Martin Lewis is an engineer working in Cambridge, who in his spare time is a telescope maker, sketcher of the skies and planetary imager. Martin will be explaining how the recently developed method of Lucky Imaging can be used to create much better images of the planets than was possible in the past, even with the largest telescopes. He will explain the method and show some of his results, including high resolution pictures of Mars, Jupiter, Saturn and the International Space Station. 9th June: Sport and Action

Roger Hance FRPS, AFIAP, BPE5* has been a club photographer for over thirty years. Having achieved the rare distinction of being awarded three RPS fellowships in one year, he subsequently served on both the Licenciate and the Natural History panels of the RPS for a number of years. When he finally made the switch from film to digital he found that his scope of photographic possibilty was enhanced, and it was then that he became interested in action photography.

Tonight's talk shows a range of different sports ranging from Rugby, Athlethics, Boxing, Table Tennis, Ice Hockey, Speedway, Sidecar Motorcross, Jet Ski, Superbikes, Marathon and Swimming. Roger will show where to take the pictures, what equipment to use, and how to gain access to sports where you normally need a 'press pass'.
